THE HOLY FAMILY

“Rise, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child’s life are dead.” - Mt 2:20

“Rise, take the child and his mother, flee to Egypt, and stay there until I tell you.” 725 kilometers. That’s the distance on modern roads from Bethlehem to Cairo. Assuming one covered 40km a day on foot — ambitious for two young parents and their infant son — the journey would take well over two weeks. Of course, the Holy Family didn’t have modern roads. They would travel through wilderness, fear bandits, run low on water, and cross the vast Sinai Peninsula in a reverse of their forefathers in Exodus. Here, in struggle and sacrifice, are the beginnings of the forging of the Holy Family.

“Joseph rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed for Egypt. He stayed there until the death of Herod.” Large Jewish communities existed in most major cities of the ancient Mediterranean world, after the collapse of their kingdoms chronicled in the Old Testament, and Joseph could likely find work as a carpenter. All the same, today’s Gospel reminds us that the first formational years of Jesus as a babe-in-arms were spent in a strange land. The members of the Holy Family were foreigners, outsiders, immigrants.

The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. God took on our humanity. He is in solidarity with our own trials and difficulties. On the feast of the Holy Family, we honor the special place of the family within society. We are invited, too, to recall those families who share in the struggles of the Holy Family in a particular way. We pray for immigrants, asylum seekers, and refugees. We pray for all parents who sacrifice their own well-being and comfort so their children may have a better life.

Fr. Ray's Book Review

In Chapter 4 we look at "The Manna of the Messiah." With the first exodus manna was an important element for four reasons: 1) The manna in the desert was no ordinary bread. It was miraculous bread from heaven given by God to his people for them to eat. 2) The gift of manna was a double miracle. In the morning God gave them manna, but in the evening they ate the flesh of the quail. 3) Not only was manna eaten, but they were also to preserve some of it by placing it in the Tabernacle. 4) Manna had a distinctive flavor, it tasted like wafers made with honey as a foretaste of the Promised Land.

Early Jews believed that manna was actually created on the 7th Day of Creation; it was the perfect food, and thus a return to Eden. It was also believed that manna was kept in heaven, within the heavenly Temple of God. Finally the early Jews believed that manna stopped falling to earth when the children of God entered the Promised Land and would not fall to earth again until the Messiah came.

Jesus himself will refer to the new manna twice: the first time when he taught his disciples the Lord's Prayer, and the second time when he said that he was the Bread of Life which the disciples would have to eat and drink. In the Lord's Prayer Jesus invited us to say, "Give us this day our supernatural bread." This is the miraculous food that the Messiah would give us for our journey to the new Promised Land. From a Jewish perspective, if the Eucharist of Jesus is the new manna from heaven, then it can't be just a symbol. It must be supernatural bread from heaven.

Some said that this was a difficult teaching. It was not that they did not understand him. Their problem was that they did not believe him. Many of his disciples left him. For us to stay faithful we need to understand and accept two things: 1) The mystery of Jesus' divine identity and 2) The mystery of the Resurrection.

THE HOLY NAME OF JESUS

Persons who played prominent roles in the history of salvation often received their names from God Himself. Adam — man of the earth; Eve — mother of all the living; Abraham — father of many nations; Peter — the rock. The Savior's precursor was given the name God assigned him. According to divine precedent, then, the name of the Redeemer should not be accidental, of human choosing, but given by God Himself. For His name should express His mission. We read in Sacred Scripture how the angel Gabriel revealed that name to Mary: "You shall call His name Jesus." And to St. Joseph the angel not merely revealed the name but explained its meaning: "You shall call His name Jesus, for He shall save His people from their sins." The Messiah should not only be the savior, but should be called Savior. With Jesus, therefore, the name actually tells the purpose of His existence. This is why we must esteem His name as sacred. Whenever we pronounce it, we ought to bow our heads; for the very name reminds us of the greatest favor we have ever received, salvation.

**Why do we do that?
Catholic Life Explained...**

I'd like to make some new resolutions about practicing the faith in our family during the new year. Do you have any suggestions?

The family is the most essential space for the formation of values and character. Practicing your faith as a family can happen both internally and externally. Consistent prayer together builds habits that can last a lifetime. With younger children, praying together as a family in the evening or at dinnertime could be fairly doable most nights. In the evening, select a few common prayers such as the Our Father, Hail Mary, or Guardian Angel prayer. Ask each of your children to thank God for three things that day and include a time for children and adults alike to pray out loud for special needs in your family. This practice could be done with older children, committed to intentional efforts in the midst of increasingly busy schedules.

Look for other opportunities to practice the faith outside the home as well. Sunday Mass should already be part of your family's weekly routine. Consider setting other monthly goals as well. This could be a family service project in your city, attending the sacrament of Confession together, or hosting a hospitality night in your home. Get your children involved in the planning process. Ask them where they'd like to volunteer or who they think is having a hard time and might need a special night just for them. Rather than simply imposing new practices, your whole family can have a dynamic role understanding and integrating faith and life.

EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP

God's GPS Never Fails

I use GPS wherever I go, and it serves me well most of the time. However, sometimes it leads me to a place that does not exist. Then there are those times when I am about to turn, and the man inside my phone shouts out, "GPS signal lost!" or "Rerouting!" The problem is, when the area is unfamiliar to me, I have no choice but to listen. I could try to get where I am going by simple intuition or by pulling over to look at a paper map, but I don't trust my sense of direction. And I haven't bought a paper map in close to a decade!

Many people move through life without any direction. They find themselves constantly rerouting and wondering when they will ever get to a satisfying final destination. What they need is a compass and a companion for the journey. Yet they have no idea how to get either.

Prayer can serve as a compass, and it connects us to a companion for the journey. Stewardship living is impossible without prayer. If we count on our own will and believe we can become fruitful without daily contact with the Divine, we can find ourselves looking for directions more than moving toward a destination. God, through prayer, will help us see all we have as a gift. God, through prayer, will lead us away from materialism and selfishness and toward freedom and generosity. Even when we fall to sin, the path back is clearer. God's GPS signal is never really lost.

FEAST OF THE HOLY FAMILY

In Amoris Laetitia, Pope Francis calls dialogue "essential" for family life.

1. Recognize the real "importance" and dignity of the other person. Recognize others' right "to think as they do and to be happy" (no. 138).
2. Try to understand where the other person is coming from: his or her pain, disappointments, fear, anger, hopes, and dreams (no. 137).
3. Put yourself in the other's "shoes"; try to "peer" into his or her heart. This is the starting point for dialogue (no. 138).
4. Be ready to "listen patiently and attentively to everything the other person wants to say." Dialogue requires the "self-discipline" of waiting until someone is finished speaking before responding (no. 137).
5. "Keep an open mind." We need not stick to our own "limited ideas and opinions," but we must "be prepared to change or expand them" (no. 139).
6. Our goal is to advance the common good. Respect and appreciation for the "other" are necessary prerequisites (no. 139).
7. Try not to offend, and don't vent. We must choose our words carefully, be sensitive to how others feel, and never seek to inflict hurt (no. 139).
8. Love everyone. "Love," Pope Francis writes, "surmounts even the worst barriers." When we come from a place of love, we can better understand others (no. 140).
9. Base positions on beliefs and values, not on the desire to "win" an argument or be "proved right" (no. 140).
10. Pray! True dialogue, Pope Francis reminds us, "can only be the fruit of an interior richness" nourished by our quiet time with God through reading, reflection, prayer, and "openness to the world around us" (no. 141).
11. These are challenging words from Pope Francis. How might our own families be different if we took his words to heart?
