

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word, for my eyes have seen your salvation, which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and glory for your people Israel." Very often, having more light is not something we desire as it forces us to confront something we really do not want to see. There can be comfort found in darkness. It has an eerie sense of security to it. We do not have to challenge ourselves or be challenged and can simply exist in some fabricated state of self-fabricated blissfulness. Jesus came to bring light, and it is a light that is resisted by many and hated by some. It is a light that causes us to see things as they really are and not as we would want or need them to be.

It is no wonder then that Simeon boldly and honestly proclaims to Mary, "Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted and you yourself a sword will pierce so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed." We have to take the Gospel message as it is and not just use those parts that are useful to us or more palatable. Taking Jesus at face value can and will lead to turmoil and dissention. Hearts will be pierced. Whether we like it, Jesus' proclamation of what the world God created really ought to look like has real and absolute social implications.

It has a lot to say about how we treat our brothers and sisters: spiritually, personally, economically, and globally. It has everything to do with the poor, the immigrant, the scared, the unborn, the vulnerable, the sick, and the broken. The light opens us to a challenging, table-turning experience that may not be something we want to see but shows us where we need to be. **©LPi**

Fr. Ray's Book Review

Chapter 1: Justin and the Proof from Prophecy

The first chapter begins with the account of St. Justin's trial for being a Christian. Justin would write two Apologies about the Catholic faith using philosophy to do so. He had learned things in all the common philosophical schools, but found the truth in the Catholic Church.

Many years before his conversion Justin had met an old man who asked Justin if philosophy could make someone happy. At that time Justin believed philosophy could make you happy. The old man began to tell Justin about God. Justin said he despaired; thought he could never know God. The old man told him that the prophets had direct knowledge of God. Justin never met the old man again, but he started to read the prophets and he knew that he finally found the truth that he was looking for, not only God but also true happiness. These days you seldom see Christians using that argument to convince non-Christians: Jesus must be the Son of God because the Hebrew prophets predicted his life so accurately.

In the year 150 Justin will write about the Mass, and his description has not changed that much today. Justin said that only Catholics can receive the Eucharist and that all of the Catholics would meet at one place on Sunday to celebrate the Mass. He will often quote Malachi 1:11-12 in his works, much like we do today when we use the Third Eucharistic Prayer at Mass; "I have no pleasure in you, says the Lord; and I will not accept your sacrifice at your hands: for, from the rising of the sun unto the going down of the same, my name has been glorified among the Gentiles, and in every place incense is offered to my name, and a pure offering: for my name is great among the Gentiles." Everything is clear and in place with Justin: the idea of the Eucharist as the pure sacrifice Malachi foretold and the idea of Christians as the new chosen people of God. Justin was certain that Malachi had seen it all centuries before it happened.

#### Why do priests wear vestments? Do they have a special meaning?

Vestments are clothes worn for a specific purpose. Priests will joke that they cover a thousand flaws. But our own manner of dress often corresponds to what we do. We dress up for special occasions, and for special guests. We wear certain clothes for golf, for outdoor activities, and years ago, we even had our "Sunday best" clothes we wore just for Church. Vestments are much the same, and each one has a meaning. The alb is a reminder of the baptismal garment. The stole is a symbol of ordained ministry and authority within the Church. The chasuble reminds us that we are on a pilgrimage of faith, passing through this life towards heaven.

Priests wear vestments for two basic reasons. First, they draw attention to the importance and solemnity of the act of worship. The color of the vestments indicates the season of the year or the feast being celebrated. Secondly, vestments draw attention to what the priest does, rather than who he is. In the celebration of the Mass, the focus is on what we do together, on our common unity, and on the mystery and person of Christ.

## Guide to the Catechism of the Catholic Church

### Christian Morality Is Life in Christ

"Incorporated into Christ by Baptism, 'Christians are dead to sin and living for God in Christ Jesus' (Rom 6:11)," Catechism, 1694.

St. Paul attributed all his spiritual growth to his life "in Christ Jesus," a phrase he used dozens of times in his letters. Jesus was the secret weapon for his moral development. After the Creed as faith professed and sacraments as faith celebrated, the catechism turns our attention to Christian morality. First, the context for Christian morality is established, and then the Ten Commandments are analyzed. This approach preserves the Catechism's resolute insistence on the primacy of God's initiative through revelation, salvation, and grace followed by our human response in faith, celebration, and Christian witness. Hence morality begins with the call to life in Christ and the Holy Spirit. Covenant love comes first, then the response of Christian affection by living the Commandments. This saves us from both legalism and from piety without practical witness.

#### The Foundation of Our Dignity

Christian moral teaching begins with a vision of human dignity as an image of God, capable of knowing, loving, and serving Him and one another. We also image God by entering into a community of persons and thus reflect the loving communion of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Our human dignity causes us to experience our God-given freedom, as well as the response-ability, to covenant with the Lord. On our moral journey we have the assistance of the *Catechism* for understanding these essential elements: the morality of human acts, 1749-1761; the morality of our passions, 1762-1775; and formation, judgments, and choices of our conscience, 1776-1802.

#### We Grow by Virtue and Gift

Central to moral growth is the Spirit-assisted acquisition of virtues. The cardinal virtues of prudence, justice, temperance, and fortitude along with the theological virtues of faith, hope, and charity are the seven good habits of highly effective Christians. Grooved into our minds, wills, and souls, these habits turn us to God, strengthen us to resist evil, and are essential to Christian character formation (see the *Catechism*, 1803-1845). To acquire these virtues we are helped by the seven gifts of the Holy Spirit: wisdom, knowledge, understanding, courage, counsel, piety, and fear of the Lord. The harmonious interplay between the gifts and the virtues constitute a powerful source for moral living. By beginning with life in Christ and the Spirit, the Church teaches us that Christian morality is impossible without divine help and identity with divine life. We clearly do not walk alone.

#### Reflection

- 1. What is the foundation for Christian morality?
  - The primary and ultimate reference for this (moral) catechesis will always be Jesus Christ, "the way, the truth and the life" (Jn 14:6; *Catechism*, 1698).
- 2. How is human dignity related to Christian morality?

The dignity of the human person is encompassed by our creation in the image and likeness of God. By their deliberate acts, human persons conform themselves (or not) to the good attested by God through moral conscience (*Catechism*, 1700).

3. What gift sustains our life of virtue?

The moral life of Christians is sustained by the gifts of the Holy Spirit. These are the permanent dispositions which render us docile to the impulses of the Holy Spirit (*Catechism*, 1830).

#### Prayer

O Jesus, be my way, my truth, my life. Holy Spirit give me the gifts that make my Christian moral life possible.
